### FROM THE PRESIDENT

On Saturday, May 18, I was able to attend the hybrid version of the Northern Great Lakes Synod Assembly. Ascension Lutheran Church was the host site for our conference. Through the power of technology we were connected to the other conferences. This Assembly brought back memories of the state-wide meetings I attended for the teacher's association to which I belonged. There is a necessary amount of governance to go through, but this assembly also included some very moving parts. The worship in the middle of all the necessary business was wonderful. The report of our Bishop was very informative. As she began I wrote down some notes.

Some were facts and ideas of hers and some notes I wrote were my thoughts and reactions. I started by jotting down the phrase reality check. The Bishop was going through the openings we have in our Synod and the number of candidates now in the Seminaries that usually provide newly ordained ministers ready for their first calls. The number of candidates is way down. The number of congregations that can only afford to call a first-call minister is guite large. Add to this those congregations that are looking to call an experienced minister and we see why the wait for filling a vacancy has extended from a year to two years and sometimes an even longer wait. There is no doubt that the Church is in a period of great change and transformation. It was at this point in the report of the Bishop that I wrote down a note of my own. I jotted down:

Grateful? And then I wrote down: How Grateful? I want to be very clear here. I was not arguing against what the Bishop was reporting. She stated that she wanted to be very clear and not illusory (her words). She did not want to give an illusion that things were going better than they are. Our Bishop is predicting great changes in how the church will work and look in the future. So looking at our congregation at present, I am grateful for our minister and all the work she does for and with us. We are very fortunate to have been able to call a talented first - call minister willing to come to the Northwoods to serve a small congregation. I am very aware of the challenges we face, but I have always been grateful and optimistic in all things. We need to continue to reach for hope. And depend on God to provide. Why do we come together in the first place as a congregation? We share and feel God's love. Enough for now. There are other things that stand out during this assembly that over time I will share with you.

By the time you read this newsletter, the work authorized by our special congregational meeting to replace the boiler in the parsonage may well be done. At least a good part of it. It took a very short time after the meeting for donations to come rolling in. We have some very generous people in this congregation. Thanks to them for responding with such generosity. As of this writing, we are not all the way there, so please keep your donations coming in. As always if there are any questions or concerns you have please bring these to the attention of a member of your council.

### FROM THE BISHOP

Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit.

~John 12: 24

Dear People of the Northern Great Lakes Synod, The season of gardening is almost upon us. When I was a child, my mother would cajole, plead, and bribe me and my siblings to take a turn weeding in the garden. I always resisted, disliking not only the bending in the hot sun, but the time away from play, even as I had just complained that there was nothing to do.

After my family and I moved to Republic, my husband and I agreed to try gardening. As we planned and planted, I regretted not having paid more attention to all the wisdom that I know my mother had about gardening, but I was too reluctant a student.

It was a surprise to me then, as I weeded the garden, when I unintentionally uprooted a green bean seed that had already sprouted, and what surprised me was how the seed was literally disappearing into the

sprout. As I held this disturbed sprout in my dirty hand, I could see that the seed had been split open by the urgent growth of this little tendril

shoot that sprung from the mysterious depth of the center of this seed, no bigger than....well....a bean seed. The two halves of the seed that flanked the sprout were pushed to the sides, up and away, and they were getting smaller as the sprout gathered what remained of the seed into itself for upward growth. I had never seen a seed sprout, not that I could remember, not that I had

ever paid attention. And I was newly in awe of the miracle that God provides with seeds and dark earth, water and sun. And then to think that this small sprout would, and indeed did, grow into a bush full of green beans, despite all the weeds that surrounded it. One small seed was transformed into a gallon freezer bag full of long and plump green beans, beans that graced our table at more than a few meals, where my children could count on me to say, just as my mother had, "These beans are from the garden."

God is in the business of new life and transformation, most particularly, transforming death into life. And we are both privileged and burdened to witness the current and ongoing transformation of the Church. Death is hard. We suffer it. We would rather not die. And yet, there is no Easter without Good Friday.

This Spring, in this Easter season of new life, the

congregation of St. James in Marinette, WI will give new life to the Church as their church closes. Its end will also be a beginning as it loses itself in support of other ministries and participation in other communities of faith. And yet, St. James will never be lost. It will be remembered and honored as any beloved whose life we celebrate. As in all things, it had a beginning and it will have an end, that God transforms into beginning again. Just as Jesus the Christ was transformed. Through the open and empty tomb, we are given the clear message that death is not the final word. The grain that was buried for three days is still bearing fruit – as the faithful gather, as they are equipped, as they are sent to plant seeds of faith – seeds that lose themselves in new growth and yield a harvest to a world hungry for the presence of God in Christ Jesus.

May God bless your seed sowing efforts, both in the dirt of your garden and in the world.
